Duty managers are “appointed” persons and are qualified in First Aid • Equipment chosen for its high standard and child protection ROSPA inspected • All fall-arrest equipment to current specification and inspected daily • All accompanying adults and children to be present during the welcome and health and safety introduction given by education staff • Teachers, parents and carers to supervise and be responsible for pupils behavior at all times whilst onsite, including during tours, free time in the glasshouses and play area. • School staff to give verbal warning if inappropriate behaviour spotted • Code of pupil behaviour agreed with teacher and children before visit

Additional points:

- As supervision and pupil behavior are the responsibility of the school staff we request a suitable ratio of teachers/ group leaders/ parents/ carers to children:
 - For primary groups: Minimum of 2 teachers to 15 children
 - For secondary school groups: Minimum of 2 teachers to 15 children
- For children suffering with allergies it is the teachers' responsibility for adequate supervision and care. NB Nut allergies: Some animals are fed nuts infrequently in their diet and the feed mixes used for our free ranging species are not produced in a guaranteed nut free environment and may be located throughout the glasshouses.
- A Brazil nut pod is used for demonstration during some of our guided tours. It is the teachers' responsibility to inform The Living Rainforest Education staff prior to your visit regarding any medical conditions or allergies and to bring any appropriate medication to be held by the schools nominated first aider.
- Teachers and pupils should be aware that our animals are fed after school visiting hours; however uneaten pieces of food may remain visible in the animal enclosures. This may cause distress as some species including our snakes and monitor are fed dead rodents.
- Individuals or groups that do not follow the Health & Safety information given may be asked to leave the glasshouses by a member of the LTR Staff in the interests of Safety
- We are happy for you to use the following information to assist you in carrying out a risk assessment of our site, but would like to make it clear that these are guidance notes only. Responsibility for carrying out a full risk assessment for your school's visit to the Living Rainforest remains with the school. These notes should not be used in place of that assessment.
